Youth constitute 56% of Accra city's population Economic active population is 823,327. Tertiary service sector, employs about 65.46.%. Secondary sector employes about 22.34%. 12,2% of the city's workforce are unemployed Rapid growing city with Vehicle of plastic pollution Transportation is maily by road and rail

PRESENTATION OF THE CITY OF ACCRA

Population of about 1,782,150 (2021)

Capital and largest city in Ghana, Second populous but highest population density

- 13 district governments
- Territory of 199.4km

Characterized by 19th century colonial architecture to modern skyscrapers and apartment blocks

Features marginal hot semi-arid climate, borders on a tropical wet and dry climate of 25.9C to 29.6C

Coastal city and vulnerable to climate change impacts

Designated as a global city (international influence and connectedness

ZOOMKIDS CSR PROGRAMME ON GREEN SKILLS AND SANITATION The city of Accra believes inclusion of youth and children in needs identitification, planning, finding solutions, implementing programs

- and decision making in developmental and local governance.
- Development of the Accra city is centered on the active role of the youth in budgeted plans and strategic projects for the betterment of lives in the city
- The city facilitates town hall meetings, meet the press and open forums to give a voice to the voiceless
- Children are empowered through free basic education and access to information at community libraries, digital centers and national development feedback channels supervised by Social Welfare and Community Development Officers
- The empowerment of the National Center for Civic Education, Ministry of Gender, Children and Social Protection Domestic Violence and Victim Support Unit to provide security and support to marginalized and vulnerable children, youth, and women at the district level with designated desk officers.

Lessons learned

- Economic hardships and inadequate access to infrastructure impedes the participation of children and youth
- Traditions and culture are key elements that impacts children and youth inclusion
- Empowering Institutions through effective decentralization maximizes efforts and outcomes
- Children and Youth are great assets to city development

Political recommendations

- Implement Report on child and youth participation with thematic indicators at the youth, institutional, and enabling environment levels across programs within cities and across cities to inform decisions for effective management.
- Government Institutions and Agencies should develop measures to monitor levels of children and youth participation at district levels
- Cities should design studies that compare child and youth participation programs with non-responsive participation avenues for reviews.
- Capacity building programmes should be objective for positive outcomes
- Resource allocation to cities should be based on population and transparent
