





Local Democracy as an Ecosystem

Local governments must guarantee the structure of this system and its development



It must take into account three dimensions: the representative democracy, the deliberative democracy and the direct democracy

Local governments must promote the collaboration with citizens in the coproduction, codesign and coimplementation of policies and services



Its channels and processes must be able to be activated from local governments or through citizen initiative

"Effective participation and collaboration among all relevant stakeholders [...] in order to identify opportunities for urban economic development" (Section 48)

"To promote participatory age and gender-responsive approaches at all stages of the urban and territorial policy and planning processes" (Section 92) "To broaden inclusive platforms [...] that allow meaningful participation in decision-making [...] processes" (Section 41)





Local governments have to be able to expedite the implementation of community projects for citizens and the enhancement of the capacity of citizens and their resilience




Local governments have to draw up programs and plans for the advancement of "associativisim" and promote community work in the services that they provide for the population


